Jacinto sometimes has to walk very far to find branches on the ground. No one cuts down trees.



Every morning Jacinto goes to school in the village.

He has to go through fields, climb over fences, and cross little streams.

During the rainy season it's not easy to get to school because there is mud everywhere.





While Jacinto is in school, his mother stays home to make tortillas, flat cakes made out of corn. It takes a long time to prepare them.

First she has to soak the kernels of corn, rinse the kernels, and then crush them with a rock.

After this, Jacinto's mother makes a kind of dough.

Then she takes small portions of the dough, rolls them into balls, and flattens them like pancakes.

Finally, she puts them on a flat stone over the fire to cook.

Jacinto doesn't have school in the afternoon.

Jacinto and his uncle have to work hard to grow enough food for the whole year. At the end of each day, they are exhausted and fall asleep on the floor of Jacinto's house.

Jacinto is very proud that he can help his mother. Jacinto and his mother love one another very much.

But the kind of life that Jacinto leads is hard for a child and Jacinto has no time to play.
